Community champion

I attended Berwickshire Club Sport awards 2023, There was a fantastic show of local talent and sportsmanship as clubs from across Berwickshire received acknowledgement of their fantastic achievements. Winning the Special Achievement Award, Jock Shiells from the Eyemouth and District Rehab Support Group.

In April 2004, Jock was diagnosed with Chronic Obstructive Pulmonary Disease (COPD). When Jock was diagnosed with a chronic lung condition, he was shocked to discover there was no support available for him apart from some basic rehabilitation.

Determined to improve his health, Jock decided he would try to set up a rehabilitation group which would offer exercises as well as social interaction. In 2013 Jock introduced the Eyemouth & District Rehab support group to the Scottish Borders and it ran from Eyemouth Leisure Centre. Several years on, the rehab group has become such a success that it is now one of the biggest of its kind in Scotland with GP's referring new members on a regular basis. From its inception in 2013, with an initial membership of 6 people – all of whom, like Jock has COPD the group has expanded to include members with Parkinson's, Cerebal Palsy, spinal injuries, and other disability conditions.

The group now has now over 90 members aged from 40 upwards and there are referrals from Borders General Hospital, Eyemouth Health Centre and Chest Heart and Stroke Scotland.

Unfortunately, Jock was unable to attend the awards, however, his friend Arlene Rawlins received the trophy on his behalf. Well done Jock for all your hard work – changing many people's lives for the better!

A flag for Berwickshire

The new Berwickshire Flag has been announced, after many years and attempts Berwickshire finally has its own flag. Well done to all involved in making this happen.

Community council meeting attendance

All CCs have been attended when not conflicting with other meetings. Coldingham CC has a new full CC with ten members. Reston and Witsome/Allanton conflict each month so I try to catch up with everyone as much as possible.

Ayton after a long absence has a full CC with 12 members. Other CCs are running well. A huge thankyou to all CCs for working with me over the last year, there have been many issues to resolve from battery storage planning issues to lost toilets.

Working with CCs has helped to identify new ways to find support for our communities by bringing motions to council. Examples as follows.

Supporting our bus service with Motion to Council.

Bus Motion October 2023

Members agree:

The Leader of Scottish Borders Council, Cllr Euan Jardin Write to the Scottish Government requesting a review of Free bus travel reimbursement, specifically the following:

The National Bus Travel Concession Scheme for Young Persons (Scotland) Order 2021 (legislation.gov.uk) & Notes: Under 22 concessionary card scheme has two reimbursement rates 43.6% for under 16s and 81.2% for over 16s.

The National Bus Travel Concession Scheme for Older and Disabled Persons (Scotland) Order 2006 (legislation.gov.uk)

& Notes: Currently the reimbursement rate is £55.0% per fair which is significantly low adding immense pressure to services.

Council agrees:

To use as an example, SBC reimbursement from Transport Scotland on £1787.55 of bus pass fairs was £974.65, a reduction of £812.90 on the original fare.

Rural areas such as the Scottish Borders are disproportionately affected with no busy city bus services to support them.

Council agrees:

The Scottish government has fallen short in its legislation, adding to disproportionate pressures on Scottish Borders Council and commercial Bus services.

The legislation states the following:

Reimbursement of operators

12.—(1) It is to be an objective (but not a duty) of the Scottish Ministers to provide that operators are financially no better and no worse off as a result of their participation in the Scheme, taking account of the costs (including a reasonable profit) of a well-run undertaking that is adequately equipped with the means to provide the eligible service.

Foreword,

The community of Eyemouth while getting to grips with the permanent closure of the toilets in Eyemouth have a very agreeable proposal. To open one accessible toilet in the FMA car park toilet block for a period of six months, supported by SBC. This enables the community to have time to adapt and agree a way forward with potential community asset transfer or whatever may happen going forward.

If ever there was an opportunity to utilise the covid recover fund I feel this would be it. Toilets closed over covid lock downs being reopened for six months, utilising the recover fund to allow the community an opportunity to look forward. While ensuring a busy summer season has the right facilities in the right place.

Supporting reopening of public toilets

Motion to council June 2023

Council agrees to utilise the Covid recover fund to enable the opening of the accessible Eyemouth public toilets, located at the FMA car park.

The fund should cover six months cleaning as well as six months stock of cleaner, toilet rolls and staffing costs. This period will allow joint working with the community to ensure Eyemouth has the appropriate opportunity to address the permanent loss of the toilets.

Fighting against bank closures and the cashless society any way possible.

Motion to council

Council Agrees that the leader Euan Jadine write to The Scottish Government & UK Government, demanding action against the closure of banks in the Scottish Borders.

Request Governments open an enquiry into Banks claims that customers are moving to online banking willingly.

Request government open an enquiry into lack of consultation on bank closures with customers.

Request Governments open an Enquiry into the lack of consultation with the public, over the introduction of Central bank digital currencies (CBDC) and the cashless society that awaits the public.

BERWICKSHIRE AREA PARTNERSHIP

It has been great to have agendas set by the public and to welcome some great guests like Berwickshire Swap as well as support by local businesses like Giacopazzis. Unfortunately, the December meeting was canceled due to bad weather. 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Community Update – East Berwickshire – PS Ali Granger

As mentioned in Octobers MMWR, Chief Inspector Stuart Fletcher is now in post as the Local Area Commander. He has made the following comments to local press -

"I am delighted to have the opportunity to work in the Scottish Borders again as your Local Area Commander and to put my years of policing experience to use in delivering a high quality of service. I know that the Borders is made up of many unique, and proud, communities and I want to be as visible as I possibly can, both to my colleagues, partners and local people. We know that Police Scotland faces significant financial pressures at this time, but I am committed to working to ensure a policing response to issues that is both proportionate and appropriate, whilst working collaboratively to ensure our resources are deployed to the greatest benefit of the communities that we serve" – CI Stuart Fletcher – Local Area Commander. All officers have been involved in White Ribbon Campaign – 16 days of action against gender based violence. It started on 25th November 2023, which is the International Day for the Elimination of Violence Against Women and concluded on December 10th 2023 which is International Human Rights Day. During this period we were holding stalls offering domestic abuse advice and raising awareness in various locations across the Scottish Borders.

Local community officer PC Jacobs and School Link Officer PC Cameron worked hard with our colleagues in Scottish Fire and Rescue Service on delivering messages to the local community regarding Bonfire and Fireworks safety in the days leading up to 5th November. This preventions work meant there was a very low level of antisocial behaviour related calls in the community on Bonfire night. Officers were also busy policing the many Remembrance Day Services in towns across the Scottish Borders.

Berwickshire community officers work closely with PC Cameron to engage with young people across the community and from all age groups.

Protecting most vulnerable

In November 2023 Police in the Scottish Borders attended and were involved with around 196 mental health related calls, around 25 missing person enquiries and approximately 78 domestic related incidents.

East Berwickshire had 15 mental health related calls and 1 missing person enquiries. Due to GDPR and protection of victims/subjects involved, we are unable to share any more specific information in relation to these type of call within this report.

Police Scotland work in collaboration with key partners to assist the most vulnerable within the communities and to provide support.

Reducing Violence and Anti-Social Behaviour

Assaults

On 02/11/23 report of two youths being assaulted on Northburn Road, Eyemouth. One youth caution and charged in presence of parent. School Link Officer made aware.

On 28/11/23 report of a female being assaulted at Lamberton. One female traced and issued with a Recorded Police Warning.

Anti-Social Behaviour

On 03/11/23 report of male causing a disturbance within The Tayern Public House, Evemouth.

Officers attended and male removed, no criminality and relevant paperwork submitted.

On 04/11/23 report of disturbance in Coldingham Road, Eyemouth. No criminality involved, relevant paperwork submitted.

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On 10/11/23 report of male causing disturbance in Hurkur Crescent, Eyemouth. Area searched no trace of male in area. Advice given to complainer.

On 10/11/23 report of verbal abuse in Lamberton. Advice given.

On 15/11/23 report of a disturbance within a property in Upper Burnmouth. One male arrested and taken to Hawick Police Station. Male issued with a recorded police warning for threatening and abusive behaviour.

On 20/11/23 report of male having a verbal altercation in High Street, Eyemouth. One male issued with a Recorded Police Warning.

Vandalism

Reducing Acquisitive Crime

Theft by Housebreaking

On 05/11/23 report of male having entered property in Haymons Cove, Eyemouth and stealing from within. Male charged and relevant paperwork submitted

On 05/11/23 a report was received of a caravan being broken into and the window being damaged on Queens Road, Eyemouth. One male was traced within caravan. Male arrested and caution and charged for theft and vandalism to caravan and theft in Haymons Cove earlier that morning. Appeared at court from custody.

Theft

Improving Road Safety

On 13/11/2023 - a driver was issued a fine for driving with no MOT in Reston.

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On 25/11/2023 - a driver was issued a fine and penalty points for tyre – ply/cord exposed at Grantshouse.

On 26/11/2023 - a driver was issued a fine for driving with no MOT at Eyemouth.

Killed or Seriously Injured

No accidents where persons were killed or seriously injured.

Tackling Serious and Organised Crime

Serious and organised crime enforcement – November 2023

The Scottish Borders CID Proactive Unit executed 7 Drug Warrants across the command area during November, four were positive and 8 persons were charged with drug related offences. This included another large / industrial scale Cannabis cultivation which had a potential street value of £1,250,000 which was well publicised in local and national media.

They have also been liaising with a number of forces in England in relation to further criminality involving county lines nominals and rural acquisitive crime, particularly in the Eastern are of the Scottish Borders. Inquiries here are ongoing.

Five warrants were also executed in conjunction with other departments in relation to stolen property searches across the Scottish Borders.

They would also like to highlight that the local communities across the Borders may have information which they deem insignificant in relation to people being seen at disused large premises over a period of time. Any suspicious activity will be followed up by this team but it is important that the public know they can report such matters in person at any Police Station, by use of 101 or anonymously via the Crime Stoppers charity.

A number of business cards explaining the benefits of and reassuring any caller to Crime Stoppers have been produced and can be circulated amongst the Wards should this be deemed useful. Campaigns

Scams

Victims of Phone / Internet / Doorstep Scams continue to be provided with an incident follow-up information pack containing advice intended to prevent repeat victimisation. This pack now includes a copy of the latest "Little Book of Big Scams" which covers a huge variety of common scams. Little Book of Big Scams – Cyber Scotland

As Christmas approaches, details are being distributed to retailers to make them and customers aware of Gift card scam. Fraudsters target the vulnerable and elderly who are induced to buy gift cards with the promise that they will receive a prize or a cash sum.

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After Dark

Although housebreaking can occur at any time of year criminals will often take advantage of darker

nights and shorter daylight hours. A Social Media campaign has highlighted the need for householders to keep their windows and doors locked, consider the fitting of intruder alarms, CCTV and outside security lighting, record and security mark valuable property, secure car keys out of sight and the use of Faraday pouches for keyless car entry systems.

Keep Safe Initiative

Primarily aimed at disabled members of the community helping to tackle disability hate crime, Keep Safe is a national network of over 800 safe places (including shops, libraries, pubs etc.) for anyone who may feel lost, scared or vulnerable when out in the community. About Keep Safe (iammescotland.co.uk)

All Scottish Borders Co-ops have signed up to the scheme with staff training, business packs and store signage being provided.

Rural Crime

□ Scottish Borders Partnership against Rural Crime (SBPARC) exhibited at the Border Union Show and the Ram Sales highlighting the latest rural crime prevention advice. The partnership continues to meet regularly to address local priority rural crime throughout the year.

We continue to provide security, crime prevention and livestock worrying advice to farmers and rural business. This can be requested by Farmers / Rural businesses using the Contact Us Form on the Police Scotland Website.

Domestic Abuse

Community Officers have been conducting pop up events raising awareness in Domestic Abuse and promoting the #DontBeThatGuy and White Ribbon Scotland Campaigns.

CAT Update:

During the past month SBCAT officers carried out High Visibility foot patrols and worked alongside other community agencies at various locations throughout the Scottish Borders during the three days around bonfire night

ROAD SAFETY – SBCAT have continued carrying out road checks in numerous locations in the Scottish Borders and have issued 8 traffic tickets for various offences throughout the month. Following concerns regarding antisocial driving at Tesco, Galashiels, regular checks were carried out during the month in line with direct CAT taskings, 1 diver was charged for no insurance and his vehicle was seized.

PARKING TICKETS – Officers have been carrying out high visibility patrols in Peebles, Kelso, Eyemouth, Duns, Selkirk, Galashiels, and Hawick, and addressing parking concerns there. Advice has been given to drivers and 119 tickets have been issued.

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Passing attention was given to Traquare Road, Innerleithen (no issues) The War Memorial in Coldstream (no issues) Galashiels Town Centre and Bridge Street in Kelso were also regularly checked by officers, which was also carried out as a result of requests made at the previous meeting. RURAL ACQUISITIVE CRIME – We continue to carry out static road checks in rural areas at all times of day to deter and detect rural acquisitive crime. 57 static checks were carried out throughout the Scottish Borders in November.

Regular patrols have been carried out at Monynut with nothing to report.

During the month, SBCAT officers took part in Operation Checkpoint alongside neighbouring forces. As a result of this, a number of traffic offences were detected and tickets issued. ANTISOCIAL BEHAVIOUR – High visibility patrols have continued in targeted areas of the Scottish Borders to address concerns highlighted at these locations.

4 youth warning letters were issued during the month of November in relation to youths entering and causing bother at the Cinema in Galashiels.

PROTECTING VULNERABLE PEOPLE – Part of the SBCAT role is to trace persons wanted on warrant/missing person/and bail curfew checks. SBCAT have carried out regular checks on multiple individuals who are wanted on warrant. During the past month there has been two high priority warrant executed. Both males subsequently appeared at court on these matters.

On the 28th November SBCAT officers took part in Border Rape Crisis Reclaim the Night March in

Galashiels and worked alongside partner agencies providing advice and support for interested parties.

DRUG ENFORCEMENT – SBCAT officers have taken part in two drugs search warrants in the Scottish Borders.

One in Galashiels, unfortunately the search was negative, however disruption to the supply chain continues.

A second warrant was executed at an apparently disused mill on Dunsdale Road, Selkirk. Owing to the dilapidated state of the building, the clearing took longer than usual, with officers having to do locus protection for a number of days. Eventually following an in depth structural survey, limited amounts of officers were able to enter the building and dismantle the set up. There were approximately 1400 plants with a street value of over one million pounds.
