Community Update - East Berwickshire - PS Ali Granger

County Lines Intensification week

As part of our planned intensification week between 4th and 11th March regarding County Lines, below is a short insight into what it is and signs to help recognise it. There is a hyperlink below should you wish any further information. We strongly encourage all community representatives to be aware of County lines and how to report concerns.

What is County lines?

A model of criminal exploitation whereby gangs and organised criminal networks coordinate the supply of illegal drugs, often using vulnerable adults and children. The model of exploiting young people has extended into Scotland - persons are exploited through use of threats, violence and grooming to supply and move drugs across the UK.

What is Cuckooing?

Act of taking over a person's home often by exploitation, intimidation or violence. The home then becomes a safe-house to deal drugs and gives the crime group a local base for a number of weeks, before they move onto the next house, which is a tactic to evade Police. Victims are targeted due to

disability, mental health and substance use. Victims may initially be paid, given substance or may also be threatened, intimidated, assaulted or blackmailed.

Signs of Cuckooing

Unknown persons in area/address, increase in reports of violence, antisocial behaviour usual occupant no longer at address or is less visible. Increase in drug dealing activity at the address, visitors/vehicles, and drugs paraphernalia. Occupant appears anxious or distressed. Bags of clothing or bedding around their property. Barricades within the address, including weapons.

Responding to concerns

Report concerns via 999 if someone is in immediate danger. Share less immediate concerns and information via 101 or via Crime Stoppers on 0800 555111 or <u>Giving information anonymously | Crimestoppers (crimestoppers-uk.org)</u> Alternatively drop into the police station or speak with your local officers.

Protecting Vulnerable People in a Physical & Digital World

In February 2024 Police in the Scottish Borders attended and were involved with around 181 mental health related calls, around 23 missing person enquiries and approximately 73 domestic related incidents.

East Berwickshire had 18 mental health related calls and 1 missing person enquiries. Due to GDPR and protection of victims/subjects involved, we are unable to share any more specific information in relation to these type of call within this report.

Police Scotland work in collaboration with key partners to assist the most vulnerable within the communities and to provide support.



Reducing Violence and Anti-Social Behaviour

Assaults

On 01/02/24 report of male assaulted at Chapel Street, Eyemouth. Enquiries ongoing.

Anti-Social Behaviour

On 01/02/24 report of a male shouting verbal threats to a male in Glebe Crescent, Eyemouth. Officers attended. Positive lines of enquiry being progressed.

On 03/02/24 report of a male being within the rear garden of a property in Gunsgreenhill, Eyemouth, banging on the windows and shouting abuse. Positive lines of enquiry being progressed

On 12/02/24 report of a hate on Main Street, West End, Chirnside. Male interviewed and released. Appropriate advice given. Complainer fully updated. Relevant paperwork submitted.

On 15/02/24 report of a female causing a disturbance in Crosshill, Chirnside. All had calmed down prior to police arrival. No complaints made. Relevant paperwork submitted.

On 19/02/24 report of a male attending outside a property in The Avenue, Eyemouth, banging on the door, shouting and making threats to cause damage. Male attested and charged.

Vandalism

On 02/02/24 report of the rear fire door at Chapel Quay, Chapel Street, Eyemouth having been damaged. Enquiries completed.

On 05/02/24 report of damage to a JCB that was parked on land behind Victoria Road, Eyemouth. Enquiries completed.

On 13/02/24 report of damage to front door lamp of a property in Glebe Crescent, Eyemouth. Crime Report submitted, enquiries ongoing

Reducing Acquisitive Crime

Theft by Housebreaking

On 06/02/24 report of female smashing a window and gaining entry to a property in Deanhead Road, Eyemouth. Nothing appeared to have been taken. Enquiries ongoing.

On 26/02/24 report of persons unknown having attempted to force entry to the storage shed of the Community larder at the Eyemouth United Congregational Church, Coldingham Road. The handle and wooden framing had been torn off. No entry was gained. Enquiries complete.

Theft

On 01/02/24 report of theft of scrap metal from a driveway in Queens Road, Eyemouth. Crime Report submitted. Enquiries complete.

On 05/02/24 report of theft of boat batteries from outside the workshop at Dundee House, Harbour Road, Eyemouth. Crime report submitted. Enquiries complete.

On 11/02/24 report of a set of platform steps have been taken from an insecure shed at Heughhead Farm, Eyemouth. Enquiries ongoing.

On 27/02/24 report of theft shoplifting of items from the General Store, High Street, Eyemouth. Enquiries ongoing.

Improving Road Safety

On 06/02/2024 – a driver was issued a fine and penalty points for driving with no insurance on A6112.

On 08/02/24 a driver was issued a fine and penalty points for careless/inconsiderate driving in Eyemouth.

On 28/02/2024 – a driver was issued a fine for driving with no MOT in Eyemouth.



Tackling Serious and Organised Crime

Serious and organised crime enforcement – February 2024

The Scottish Borders CID Proactive Unit executed 2 Drug Warrants across the command area during February, both were positive and 2 persons were charged with drug related offences. This included another large / industrial scale Cannabis cultivation which had a potential street value of £500,000.

They would also like to highlight that the local communities across the Borders may have information which they deem insignificant in relation to people being seen at disused large premises over a period of time. Any suspicious activity will be followed up by this team but it is important that the public know they can report such matters in person at any Police Station, by use of 101 or anonymously via the Crime Stoppers charity.

Campaigns

Fuel Theft

It's important to put measures in place to protect your fuel tank and make it extremely difficult for thieves to target your fuel.

Locate in safe location many thieves use Google Maps to find satellite images of fuel tanks.

Consider locating your tank behind a garage or shed away from roads or in clear view of your home or business. Locate inside a security gate or cage a good quality, robust fence or cage will help make life difficult for thieves. Install an alarm. Fit a fuel theft lock. Install outdoor security lighting. Low energy dusk till dawn lights are a low-cost option to protect your expensive fuels and oils. Install CCTV. Put up signage to highlight the security measures you've installed.

Scams

Victims of Phone / Internet / Doorstep Scams continue to be provided with an incident follow-up information pack containing advice intended to prevent repeat victimisation. This pack now includes a copy of the latest "Little Book of Big Scams" which covers a huge variety of common scams. <u>Little Book of Big Scams – Cyber Scotland</u>

Keep Safe Initiative

Primarily aimed at disabled members of the community helping to tackle disability hate crime, Keep Safe is a national network of over 800 safe places (including shops, libraries, pubs etc.) for anyone who may feel lost, scared or vulnerable when out in the community. About Keep Safe (iammescotland.co.uk)

All Scottish Borders Co-ops have signed up to the scheme with staff training, business packs and store signage being provided.

CAT Update:

ROAD SAFETY – SBCAT have continued carrying out road checks in numerous locations in the Scottish Borders and have issued 11 traffic tickets for various offences throughout the month.

Following concerns regarding antisocial driving at Tesco, Galashiels, and regular checks were carried out during the month in line with direct CAT taskings.

Throughout February numerous hi- vis speed and static road checks have been carried out a schools throughout the Scottish Borders at dropping off and picking up times.

On 10/02/24 officers on mobile patrol found a crashed vehicle in Hawick. Following enquiries, a male was arrested and later charged with driving whilst under the influence of alcohol along with other offences. No one was injured. A second male was charged with taking the vehicle without permission of the owner.

On 28/02/24 officers SBCAT took part in Operation Checkpoint which is a Multi force Operation targeting travelling criminals operating between counties in the North of England and Scotland. SBCAT conducted road checks on the A68, A7 and A1 targeting vehicles coming into Scotland from England. About 70 vehicles were stopped, 12 drivers were warned regarding minor offences for lights and tyres and one was issued a ticket for no MOT. A driver of an HGV was stopped and searched due to the smell of cannabis. He was found to be in possession of cannabis and under the influence of drugs. He was arrested and blood samples have been sent away for analysis prior to prosecution.

PARKING TICKETS – Officers have been carrying out high visibility patrols in Peebles, Kelso, Eyemouth, Duns, Selkirk, Galashiels, and Hawick, and addressing parking concerns there. Advice has been given to drivers and 131 tickets have been issued.

Passing attention was given to Traquair Road, Innerleithen (no issues) The War Memorial in Coldstream (no issues) Galashiels Town Centre and Bridge Street in Kelso were also regularly checked by officers along with Duns Industrial Estate (no issues).

We've also received new complaints of cars parking in ambulance spaces outside the 2 of the health centres in Hawick. We have spoken with the staff in the nearby businesses and reminded them of the parking restrictions. Regular checks are being made and parking tickets have been issued.

RURAL ACQUISITIVE CRIME – We continue to carry out static road checks in rural areas at all times of day to deter and detect rural acquisitive crime. 21 static checks were carried out throughout the Scottish Borders in this month along with numerous hi-visibility patrols of rural areas.

On 18/02/24 Officers on quadbikes at Monynut found a male in a van. It was strongly suspected the male had transported off road bikes to Monynut and friends of his were out on the bikes. The male was issued a ticket for an unrelated offence and left Monynut

Several other quad bike and vehicle patrols were completed on weekends with nothing to report.

ANTISOCIAL BEHAVIOUR – High visibility patrols have continued in targeted areas of the Scottish Borders to address concerns highlighted at these locations.

3 youth warning letters were issued during the month of February in relation to youths.

Extra patrols have been completed in the areas identified in the tasking as well as Burnfoot in Hawick due to ongoing issues with youths at the Primary School. They have also been doing foot patrols outside Jedburgh Sheriff Court on court days due to several altercations that have occurred between people attending court.

On the evening of Saturday 17/2/24 – The Specials Initiative Team (SIT) which is a team of 6 Special Constables joined the SBCAT for patrols in Hawick. The first couple of hours was spent dealing with youths committing ASB at Morrisons. They completed detailed checks at 3 licensed premises, using plain clothes officers. 2 traffic tickets were issued and several drivers were given warnings. The public noticed the extra officers and were keen the engage. The team received a lot of positive feedback. CI Fletcher is arranging for the SIT to return and work with the SBCAT in other parts of the Borders.

On 23/2/24 whilst SBCAT officers were on foot patrol in Galashiels they carried out a drug search of a male. Although this search was negative subsequent enquiries established that he had committed a shoplifting nearby. As a result he was arrested, charged and reported for theft.

On 24/2/24- Following a report of anti-social behaviour at Morrison's, Hawick. Officers attended where it was established that a 12-year-old girl had spat at a member of staff and also thrown a cardboard sign at another. Subsequent enquiries identified the girl and she was thereafter traced and charged with 2 x Assaults and threatening and abusive behaviour.

On 24/2/24- During patrol in Newton St Boswells, two female youths had alcohol seized from them. Youth warning letters issued.

PROTECTING VULNERABLE PEOPLE – Part of the SBCAT role is to trace persons wanted on warrant/missing person/and bail curfew checks. SBCAT have carried out regular checks on multiple

individuals who are wanted on warrant. During the past month a total of 10 people were arrested on warrant.

On 06/02/24 – After 3 weeks of checks for a priority warrant CAT officers found the suspect hiding in bathroom. The suspect was also found to be in possession of multiple different types of controlled drugs.

On 20/02/24 – CAT officers arrested a male wanted on a high priority warrant.

DRUG ENFORCEMENT – SBCAT officers have taken part in 1 drugs search warrants in the Scottish Borders.

On 1/2/24- CAT officers executed an MDA warrant in Galashiels which resulted in the recovery of a personal amount of cannabis and over £1,000 in cash being seized. Enquiries are ongoing (approx. 36g, value £550.00)

Between 3rd and 4th February CAT officers assisted in the recovery of approximately £500,000 worth of cannabis from a cultivation found in Berwickshire
