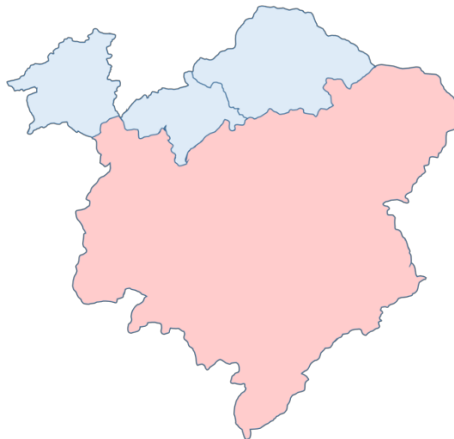

Community Update – East Berwickshire – PS Ali Granger

All the Community officers, Community Action Team Officers and School Link Officers work closely together to help tackle community priorities. Throughout January the Community Policing Team have carried out additional mobile and foot patrols to prevent and tackle antisocial behaviour.

Officers continue to work with partner agencies including Registered Social Landlords and Scottish Borders Council Antisocial Behaviour Unit to help provide support in the local community.

There was a successful Police Surgery held in Eyemouth by community officers in January and officers also attended Eyemouth Community Council meeting.

There have been several departmental initiatives throughout the Schools in East Berwickshire being led by the SLO which include

- Flag Football outreach programme at both Eyemouth and Berwickshire High Schools
- LGBTQ+ group visits to hear current issues and create positive relationships with Police Scotland
- Planning for Eyemouth Cluster Safety Days
- Working with Splash Project to discuss partnership working opportunities
- Working with Junior Road Safety Officers in East Berwickshire Primary schools, carrying out speed checks in our local community



The Community Policing Team continue to carry out road checks / speed checks throughout the area to try and help improve Road safety in our local towns and villages.

Protecting most vulnerable

In January 2024 Police in the Scottish Borders attended and were involved with around 204 mental health related calls, around 18 missing person enquiries and approximately 82 domestic related incidents.

East Berwickshire had 18 mental health related calls and 0 missing person enquiries. Due to GDPR and protection of victims/subjects involved, we are unable to share any more specific information in relation to these type of call within this report.

Police Scotland work in collaboration with key partners to assist the most vulnerable within the communities and to provide support.



Reducing Violence and Anti-Social Behaviour

Assaults

On 06/01/24 report of a member of staff being assaulted by a female at Scoutscroft Holiday Park, Coldingham. No complaints made. Relevant paperwork submitted.

Anti-Social Behaviour

On 02/01/24 report of a youth having been threatened in Stebbings Rise, Eyemouth. One male youth caution and charged with threatening and abusive behaviour. Relevant paperwork submitted.

On 09/01/24 report of male banging on door of a property in Killies Green, Eyemouth and shouting abusive comments. One male traced and caution and charged with threatening and abusive behaviour.

On 10/01/24 report of a male throwing stones at the window of The Home Arms, Eyemouth. Nothing ongoing on police arrival. No trace of any persons. Advice given, no damage.

On 11/01/2024 report of a disturbance at the Contented Sole, Harbour Road, Eyemouth. A female has been charged with threatening and abusive behaviour.

On 11/01/2024 report of a disturbance at North Grange House, Coldingham. No criminality or complaints made.

On 08/01/24 report of damage being caused to the lock of a property in Renton Terrace, Eyemouth. Safety advice given. Enquiries complete, relevant paperwork submitted

On 21/01/24 report of a vehicle being vandalised whilst parked on Windram Road, Chirnside. Enquiries ongoing.

Reducing Acquisitive Crime

Theft by Housebreaking

On 02/01/24 report of the yard being broken into at Penderguest Farm, Peelwalls, Ayton and items tools having been stolen. Enquiries complete, relevant paperwork submitted

On 08/01/24 report of theft from a van at Braeheads, Coldingham. Enquiries ongoing.

On 20/01/24 report of theft shoplifting within the Co-Op, High Street, Eyemouth. CCTV viewed, one male traced and issued with a Recorded Police Warning.

On 30/01/24 report of male stealing money from female whilst she was walking along Chapel Quay, Eyemouth. Enquiries ongoing.

On 31/01/24 report of female filling her car up with fuel at Penny Petroleum, Eyemouth and driving off without paying. Enquiries ongoing.

Improving Road Safety

On 11/01/2024 - a driver was issued a fine and penalty points for not obeying red traffic light in Eyemouth.

On 14/01/2024, Officers observed an articulated lorry travelling northbound on the A1 at Burnmouth. The vehicle was seen to overtake two articulated lorries, partially unsighted and crossing solid white lines. The driver was subsequently cautioned and charge under S3 of the Road Traffic Act for Careless driving.

On 21/01/2024 - a driver was issued a fine and penalty points for careless/inconsiderate driving in Burnmouth.

Roads Policing teams are still to provide their return for January.



Tackling Serious and Organised Crime

Serious and organised crime enforcement – January 2024

The Scottish Borders CID Proactive Unit executed 5 Drug Warrants across the command area during January, four were positive and 4 persons were charged with drug related offences.

County lines nominals and rural acquisitive crime are still prevalent in some areas of the Scottish Borders and we are working closely with colleagues in England and local partners to detect and identify offenders in this area of criminality.

Two warrants were also executed in conjunction with other departments in relation to serious crime inquiries.

Cannabis Cultivations

Pro-active CID would again like to highlight that the local communities across the Borders may have information which they deem insignificant in relation to people being seen at disused large premises over a period of time.

Any suspicious activity will be followed up by this team but it is important that the public know they can report such matters in person at any Police Station, by use of 101 or anonymously via the Crime Stoppers charity

Campaigns

Fraud

January saw a national campaign throughout Police Scotland focusing on Fraud. Online sales and romance frauds and the links they have to gift card Scams.

Keep Safe Initiative

Primarily aimed at disabled members of the community helping to tackle disability hate crime, Keep Safe is a national network of over 800 safe places (including shops, libraries, pubs etc.) for anyone who may feel lost, scared or vulnerable when out in the community. All Scottish Borders Co-ops have signed up to the scheme with staff training, business packs and store signage being provided.

Rural Crime

- Scottish Borders Partnership against Rural Crime (SBPARC) exhibited at the Border Union Show highlighting the latest rural crime prevention advice. The partnership continues to meet regularly to address local priority rural crime throughout the year.

CAT Update:

ROAD SAFETY – SBCAT have continued carrying out road checks in numerous locations in the Scottish Borders and have issued 7 traffic tickets for various offences throughout the month.

Following concerns regarding antisocial driving at Tesco, Galashiels, and regular checks were carried out during the month in line with direct CAT taskings and 1 driver was reported for driving with no insurance.

Throughout January numerous hi- vis speed and static road checks have been carried out at schools throughout the Scottish Borders at dropping off and picking up times.

PARKING TICKETS – Officers have been carrying out high visibility patrols in Peebles, Kelso, Eyemouth, Duns, Selkirk, Galashiels, and Hawick, and addressing parking concerns there. Advice has been given to drivers and 177 tickets have been issued.

In early January a female was knocked over and injured by a person driving a vehicle that had been illegally parked in Peebles town centre. Over the following days the SBCAT targeted area for parking offences and issued a total of 64 tickets in the Peebles area. On multiple occasions the officers were approached by members of the public thanking them for their efforts.

On 16/01/24 – during one shift 2 CAT officers issued 20 parking tickets in Eildon while completing other duties.

Passing attention was given to Traquair Road, Innerleithen (no issues) The War Memorial in Coldstream (no issues) Galashiels Town Centre and Bridge Street in Kelso were also regularly checked by officers, which was also carried out as a result of requests made at the previous meeting.

Following a report of illegally and poorly parked vehicles within Duns Industrial Estate Business owners and staff were spoken to and the parking regulations were explained to them. They all moved their vehicles to suitable places. Regular checks are being completed but no further parking issues have been identified.

RURAL ACQUISITIVE CRIME – We continue to carry out static road checks in rural areas at all times of day to deter and detect rural acquisitive crime. 34 static checks were carried out throughout the Scottish Borders in January along with numerous hi-visibility patrols of rural areas.

On 24/01/24 two officers conducted a patrol of Monynut on quadbike. Other regular patrols have been completed with nothing to report.

ANTISOCIAL BEHAVIOUR – High visibility patrols have continued in targeted areas of the Scottish Borders to address concerns highlighted at these locations.

16 youth warning letters were issued during the month of January in relation to youths.

On 6/1/24 following an enquiry a youth was traced and C/C'd for vandalising a shop window in Selkirk.

On 24/1/24 following a report that youths had set a fire in Selkirk, officers attended and after confirming it was a small controlled fire their presence resulted in a male youth being identified and his parents having to be spoken to.

PROTECTING VULNERABLE PEOPLE – Part of the SBCAT role is to trace persons wanted on warrant/missing person/and bail curfew checks. SBCAT have carried out regular checks on multiple individuals who are wanted on warrant. During the past month a total of 11 people were arrested on warrant. This includes 2 high priority warrants whereby the 2 individuals were remanded at court the following Monday due to the risks they posed to the public

On 12/1/24 officers reported a male for warrant after he was found to be in breach of his curfew.

On 12/01/24 – CAT officers observed two people wanted on high priority warrants. They ran off from the officers but following a foot chase they were both arrested. Due to the risk they posed to the public they were both remanded at court

DRUG ENFORCEMENT – SBCAT officers have taken part in 1 drugs search warrants in the Scottish Borders.

On 13/1/24- CAT officers carried out a drug search on a male found in a car in the Selkirk area. He subsequently failed a roadside drug wipe and was arrested (enquiries ongoing)

On 17/1/24- CAT officers executed an MDA warrant in Peebles which resulted in the recovery of a personal amount of cannabis and a male being C/C'd and reported. (approx. 22g est value, £330.00)

OTHER ISSUES OF NOTE- On 11/1/24- CAT officers arrested a person in relation to a reported Fraud. Following interview they were C/C'd with Fraud and reported to the PF.

On 18/01/24 - Following an invite from a young pupil of Drumlanrig Primary School in Hawick CAT officers attended at the school. They explained the role of the police and the actions that young children can do to help their community.
